 - x. **Mapping of Nutrition Intervention Programmes in Oyo State, Nigeria.** Accelerating Nutrition Results in Nigeria (ANRiN) project aims to increase utilization of quality, cost-effective nutrition services for pregnant and lactating women, adolescent girls and children under five years of age in 12 states of Nigeria, including Oyo State. The project was financed by the World Bank and the global financing facility under the concept Accelerating Nutrition Results in Nigeria (ANRiN). - i. **Metabolic Syndrome and Nutritional Status among Nigerian Adults.** This is an on-going multi-disciplinary team project funded by the University of Ibadan MacArthur Grant. The goal of the study is to reduce non-communicable diseases among adult Nigerians who may be poorly informed about metabolic syndrome that can lead to untimely death. It focuses on metabolic syndrome and nutrition connections as these lead to type 2 diabetes mellitus, hypertension, sexual dysfunctions among other non-communicable diseases. All preliminary data have been collected. Continuous data analyses are on-going to arrive at more findings. Collected biological samples are being preserved for further analysis as new insights become necessary. MacArthur Grant, University of Ibadan, Ibadan, Nigeria. (Co-investigator: Team member as a Public Health Nutritionist and Dietitian; and Health Educator for development of study instrument, recruitment of study participants, counseling to obtain informed consent before enlisting and data assessment).  - ii. **Impact of Rural Women Economic Empowerment Programmes on Child Care Practices and Nutritional Status.** Women economic empowerment programmes have recorded successes in women development. However, the impact of this economic empowerment programme on roles of women as mothers at the family level has not been fully investigated, especially for women with under-five children. A study was conceptualised to investigate the impact of the economic empowerment programme on women's caring capacity and the coping strategies being adopted. Women's economic empowerment programmes have been identified through the Agency in charge of Women's Development and the field sites are currently being mapped out for the project but stalled due to Coronavirus pandemic lockdown. The development of indicators to assess the impact is on-going. (Self-sponsored but hoping to get funders) (Principal investigator) (Commenced 2017 but suspended due to some logistics reasons. It was kicked off again in August, 2019 till date)
 - iii. **Adoption of National Home Grown School Feeding (NHGSF) Programme to**

promote safe dietary sodium (salt) intake and reduce risk of cardiovascular disease among school age children in South West Nigeria. This on-going study sets out to investigate salt content of the meals served in schools and compare this with the recommended sodium intake among primary school children in two selected States, including Oyo and Ogun States. The ethical approval from the relevant states' agencies to conduct the study has been obtained; the study instruments have been developed and planning for the pretesting of the instruments is on-going. Quarterly reports have been submitted to funders and feedback has been given. Corona pandemic forestalled the commencement of pretesting of data collection instrument; as there was a total lockdown to proceed. The lockdown periods are being used to conduct a Systematic Review on interventions to reduce salt intake among school-aged children in sub-Saharan Africa. The protocols for the review process has been developed and use of BOOLEAN Operator search for electronically published articles was been considered among other methods to collect relevant published works including Grey literature search of unpublished reports, projects, Theses and other relevant documents for extraction of relevant data. Funded by LINKS, a collaborative effort of the WHO, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention through the CDC Foundation and Resolve to Save Lives; an initiative of Vital Strategies (Co-Principal Investigator) (2019 – 2021).

- iv. **Communication Challenges/Barriers in Patient's Clerking and Counselling among Resident Doctors at the Outpatient Clinics of the University College Hospital, Ibadan, Nigeria.** This project was aimed at investigating the communication challenges encountered by the physicians during the clerking period and the coping strategies being adopted. The study instrument had been developed and pretested. Modification and correction of contents of the instrument post pre-testing had been completed. The list of all Resident Doctors in the University College Hospital, Ibadan had been collected. Sampling of the target population in preparation for data collection was about being completed before the Coronavirus pandemic started. The project has the potential to reveal innovative ways through which communication can be enhanced between the doctors and the patients for better management. Self-sponsored project resulting from observation in communication challenges between the Doctors and the patients at MOP Clinic, UCH while working as a Dietitian. This project is to be

executed in conjunction with some Resident Doctors. (Principal Investigator) (2019-2020).

- vi. **COVID-19 Pandemic Lockdown Restrictions and Impact on Health and Lifestyle Practices.** The purpose of this project is to investigate the impact of lockdown restrictions due to COVID-19 pandemic on health and lifestyle practices of adults. It is a multi-country survey, using an *Enketo* Express for Kobo Toolbox for data collection on line from all the countries of the world. The soft copy of the data collection tool has been developed and it is currently available on-line for adults 18 years and above to access for filling. The findings from the study will be used to plan and put in place interventions that can militate against some forms of metabolic diseases that may likely be on the rise during this pandemic. The project is supported by grant from National Research Foundation. (Co-investigator) (2020-2021).
 - vii. **Development of a Package to Improve Hypertension Control in Nigeria:** The study is aimed at developing a package, using formative research approach to promote health of hypertensive adopting the existing structures in their communities. The project is at the baseline stage and currently working on data collection tools and sampling of the project study locations and population in Nigeria. Selected members of the community who will be tagged as Community-based Oriented Resource Persons (CORPs) will be trained based on the gaps observed from the analysis of baseline data including assessment of pre-hypertensive and hypertensive conditions. The CORPs will be engaged during the intervention stage to work as change agents in the communities.
